BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all questions truthfully and honestly.
2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
3. I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow: • BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/ • The Guide to Safe Scouting: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss • SAFE: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/safe/
4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to: • Unauthorized fundraising activities • Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand • Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following: • Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles • Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter • Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies: • Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana • Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives • Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection with Scouting activities.

At Camp Sidney Dew (CSD) our goal is to provide the best possible scouting experience for youth and adults members of your unit. The Scouter Code of Conduct, the Scout Oath and the Scout Law are the guiding principals that all Scouters should live by.

Before arriving for your week at Camp Sidney Dew please remind your Scouts and leaders of the Scouter Code of Conduct. Any violation of this code will result in the Scout or Scouter to be removed from the property immediately. This includes advocating for or against any political position, promotion of, harassment, or discussion of sexual orientation, racial and religious affiliation. (This includes but is not limited to flags, symbols or slogans that may be deemed to be distracting to the mission of Camp Sidney Dew.) Conversations that discuss political or sexual orientation have no place in Scouting and cause a distraction to other scouts and scouters. Any person that is asked to leave the property will not receive a refund.

We work to ensure that every youth and adult member of the BSA has an outstanding time at Camp Sidney Dew, and ask that you help by educate and coach your scouts on what is expected of them while they are at CSD.

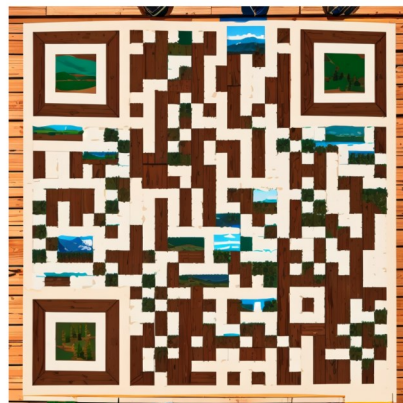
Greetings Scouts!

The Summer Camp Calendar

September 2025

Fundraising – Participate with your Troop and raise all your funds. Set a goal for your Troop and an individual goal for each Scout to achieve and FUND YOUR SCOUTING ADVENTURE!

October 2025

Register your Troop for Summer Camp at Camp Sidney Dew. **Secure your reservation** online at nwgabsa.org/summer-camp and be sure to pay your \$100 Troop non-refundable registration fee, which is applied to your Unit's camper fees.

November 2025

Promote summer camp to your troop at a meeting with scouts and parents.

December 2025

Recharter on-time! Begin collecting your first installment (\$100 per Scout) paid by February 15

February 15, 2026

Send your first installment on time so you'll be able to register for course work. **Must be received to begin with merit badge registration on March 1.**

March 2026

Camp Fees and Reservations

The fee includes a camp patch for each Scouter and can be paid using the suggested installment plan from the timeline.

The first payment of \$100 per Scout is due by **February 15, 2026**. The initial deposit is non-refundable.

The final payment (to qualify for early-bird rate) is due **May 15th**

Leaders in Camp

All Units MUST HAVE a minimum of TWO Adult Leaders. All leaders must be registered members of the BSA and must meet the qualifications for the leadership position in which they serve. The unit leader must be at least 21 years of age and have up to date Youth Protection Training. Any additional leaders must be at least 18 years of age. Parents, committee members, and other adults who accompany the unit to camp and/or plan to stay overnight, must meet all the above requirements. Units that do not meet these requirements will not be permitted to stay at camp. Linked units must have leadership for each unit.

First leader is FREE with 5 or more youth attending. Second Leader is ALSO FREE with 12 or more youth attending. ALL additional leader-spaces are available for a fee of \$145 each. Each leader-space provides meals, a tent (1 leader per tent), and one official camp patch.

Leaders may rotate when necessary; however, for the best interest of the Scouts, we recommend having consistent leadership throughout your unit's stay at camp. Units that rotate leaders during the week can fill a leader-space with more than one person if meals don't overlap. Mid-week incoming leaders must pass the health screening upon arrival at camp and submit their Health Form A,B,C at check-in. Additional leaders not staying the entire week must pay the leader fee of \$145.00.

No Pro-rated fees for participants or Leaders. To ensure enough tent space for everyone, our administrative staff will contact units with a high ratio of leaders to Scouts.

Adult leaders will be asked upon registration the number of leaders and gender per campsite.

Campsite Reservations

The \$100 campsite deposit reserves a space for your unit to attend summer camp during a specific week. It is possible that multiple units will share a campsite.

Provisional Scouts

Scouts who are unable to attend during their unit's week at camp, or who wish to attend an additional week of camp should consider attending camp with another unit from their local area. The Scoutmaster of the troop attending camp will be responsible for the Scout's paperwork. Provisional scouts should bring a completed medical form with them to camp.

Campsites

All campsites at Camp Sidney Dew are equipped with a covered pavilion, tables, water, latrine, and a fire ring. Some of the sites also are equipped with lean-to shelters and mattresses. You'll select your TOP 3 choices when registering your UNIT on Tentaroo with your initial reservation fee. Power is not provided at campsites.

Refund Policy

Units that withdraw their campsite reservation **prior to March 15th** may receive a full refund MINUS the non-refundable reservation fee. After March 15th, refunds will be considered on an individual basis and must be approved by the Camp Director. Requests must be submitted in writing. The \$100 reservation will automatically be applied to the overall balance of the current year's camp registration fees. There are *NO ROLL-OVER fees* applied to the following season. All accounts are closed annually.

Refunds will be credited to the unit's account balance. Each unit's balance must be paid in full prior to arriving at camp.

NO REFUNDS WILL BE ISSUED AT CAMP.

Scouts, not the unit, should cover all camp costs. This prevents the unit from losing money if a Scout cannot attend camp and has not yet paid. Please note that we cannot offer refunds for Scouts who leave camp early and under no circumstances may any refunds be carried over to the following summer.

Camp Sidney Dew is proud to offer complete online registration to all our units through Tentaroo. Unit leaders should update unit accounts, enter merit badge schedules, and make payments online with a Visa or MasterCard. Once submitted, you will receive confirmation via e-mail. Registration Steps and Timeline

Step 1. Troop/Camp Session Reservation – Reservation Fee Payment of \$100.00 is due.

Step 2. \$100.00 per Scout first installment is due on **February 15** in order to begin Merit Badge Registration on Tentaroo starting **March 1st**.

Step 3. \$100.00 per Scout second installment is due on **April 15**.

Step 4. BALANCE of camper fees, Merit Badge additional fees, All Leaders' fees are due on **May 15** in order to receive the EARLY BIRD DISCOUNT. Send payment with Final Payment worksheet

Step 5. Submit any additional forms as needed:

Merit Badge Registration – begins March 1

If you don't see a program or class available when you go to register online, then it is full. You will not be able to register for this program unless someone drops it. Schedules can be modified and will be finalized during check-in. Scouts are able to be added to a wait list and our staff will work to meet individual needs.

Changes to a Scout's requested schedule or other registration materials can be updated by the troop until May 15, 2025. After this date, please submit changes to our administrative staff by e-mail.

Due to the number of Scouts registering for some programs at camp, some schedules may not be exactly as requested. By "capping" our attendance each week, we avoid most scheduling problems, but at times certain classes become filled quickly. We will work with you upon arrival to ensure that every Scout gets an opportunity to take the classes they requested.

Express Check-In

Units must complete Health Checks with Medic upon arrival and check-in. Swim tests may be administered prior to camp and proof of completion (including signature of Aquatics Instructor or Red Cross Lifeguard and skill rating of each participant as well as documentation of the individual conducting the swim test) should be turned in at the pool. Aquatics staff reserves the right to re-test anyone if they deem it necessary.

Personal Animals on Camp

While we love animals of all kinds, however we cannot allow personal animals on camp property. This is to protect the health and safety of all campers who are under our care. Personal animals include, but are not limited to, emotional support animals and all other animals that are not expressly identified under the Americans with Disabilities Act. Notify the camp prior to arrival if you have a service animal need.

Bicycles

Bikes are permitted for use during summer Camp. Everyone must wear a helmet at all times and bikes may not be ridden on stairs or in structures. Bikes must be walked across all bridges, sidewalks, in campsites, and in high-traffic areas. Bikes should be checked for safety by unit leaders. Bikes may not be used off of the main road and may not be used at night.

Unit Leader Dinner

Start your week off with the best leaders dinner a Scout camp can offer. A southern BBQ with a Camp Sidney Dew twist. All adult leaders are welcome to attend this feast as we talk camp and have great fellowship.

Dining Hall

At Camp Sidney Dew we eat family style. The waiter system is used in the Dining Hall for setting the tables and cleaning up. This process will be explained in more detail during supper on Sunday and on your tour.

Tentage

All units will be housed in standard two-person wall tents or four person Adirondack shelters. The tents have wooden floors with cots. Some campsites are equipped with Adirondack shelters instead of tents. These shelters accommodate four Scouts and have permanent wooden bunk beds and vinyl-covered mattresses.



Early Arrivals

Troops that need to arrive at camp early will need to notify the Camp Director at campdirector@nwgabsa.org. There is no additional cost to arriving early, however meals are not provided until Sunday evening. Upon arrival troops will check in with the camp Ranger and be shown their campsite. Troops that are arriving early may not check in for Summer Camp prior to 2:00PM on Sunday.

Sunday Check-In

Check in begins at 2:00PM on Sundays. We ask that one leader and the SPL come inside to the Hubbs administration building to complete the check in process. You will begin the check in process with our camp medic. Please ensure that all medical forms (ABC) are filled out properly with insurance information. Medication should be turned into the camp medic for proper climate controlled and safe storage. A locked container is necessary for any medication that stays at the campsite. Dietary forms that have not been turned in prior to arriving at camp will need to be completed at this time.

Any program or class changes will be made at this time with our Program Director. Following completion of your check in process the SPL will join the rest of the troop and your troop guide for a quick tour of camp and be escorted to the swimming pool for swim test. Swim rosters/records conducted prior to camp must be turned in to the Aquatics Director with a copy of the credentials of the person who performed the test.

Dietary Restrictions

A dietary restrictions form can be downloaded from www.nwgabsa.org/summer-camp. Please have this form turned in to the Camp Director prior to May 1. One form is needed for each individual. Please be as specific as possible on these forms to ensure our camp's chef can provide the best experience possible.

Scouts and leaders are welcome to bring any supplemental food that will assist them in their special dietary needs. We will be able to store and serve all food that is brought for these purposes only.

Program Sessions

Camp Sidney Dew offers five program sessions for your Scouts to take merit badges Monday through Thursday. Action afternoon and Twilight times offer a variety of open areas for your Scouts to explore and experience all that Camp Sidney Dew has to offer as well as select merit badges during these times.

Fridays offer your troop an opportunity to explore many of the unique attractions around the Northwest Georgia area or participate in one of our off property excursions featured on page 17.

SPIKE BUCK

Spike Buck is our signature First-Year Camper program at Sidney Dew. Each Scout in the Spike Buck Program learns the basic skills that all Scouts must master to become proficient in camping and outdoor activities. There are two programs available covering those skills that are required for advancement to the ranks of Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class. Scouts enrolled in Spike Buck will also take the First Aid merit badge and the Swimming merit badge. While designed primarily for Scouts who are new to the Scouting program, and generally those coming to summer camp for the first time, it is not limited to those Scouts.

The Spike Buck staff will help Scouts master the basic skills for camping, first aid, rope work, map and compass work, and nature hiking, while building an understanding of the Troop and Patrol method.



The Camp Sidney Dew staff will do everything in its power to help each Scout become proficient in as many of the Scouting skills as possible. Each Scout will receive credit for those requirements they have completed toward the ranks of Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class. How much each Scout completes is up to them, and it is very possible for two different Scouts will complete different requirements, and that some complete more than others.

Who Should Sign Up?

Leaders should consider each Scout individually when deciding whether they should sign up for this program. While a Second-Class Scout may gain valuable skills in the program; they may be better served in the merit badge program. Likewise, a 14 or 15-year-old may be in their first summer at camp but may be advanced enough to bypass this program in favor of merit badges.

Leaders are encouraged to work with Spike Buck participants in the troop's campsite. A review there can put into practice the skills the Scouts have learned during the week.

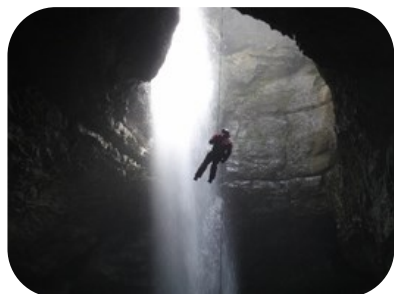

Friday Adventure Excursions

End your week with a bang! Camp Sidney Dew is proud to offer you several adventures for your troop: Explore a wild cave, zipline over a ravine, or go tubing down a river. Caving and Zipline excursions are guided by our professional outfitters. Transportation to and from the site is the responsibility of the troop. **Reservations for all excursions must be finalized by May 15th.** We can not guarantee availability for excursions to individuals added after May 15th. Meals are provided by Camp Sidney Dew.



Wild Cave Exploration— This is the adventure you have been looking for. Crawl on your belly, navigate through tight tunnels and get messy in one of the areas most unique all-weather caves. This adventure is for the whole troop! \$95 per person includes lunch and souvenir headlamp. Bring a change of clothes! *Minimum participation number is 3 and maximum is 25*

Zipline— Float through the woods and over a ravine as you travel through the air getting a birds eye view of the area. \$65 per person and lunch is included in this adventure.

Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience (C.O.P.E.)

Project C.O.P.E.—stands for Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience. Minimum age is 13. It is a ropes/confidence course created by the Boy Scouts of America to develop leadership and teamwork skills in the participants. COPE is a three-hour session that meets only in the morning. Class will not be held if minimum class size (6) is not met.

Visitors Night

Visitors' night at camp is Friday evening. At that time, parents may wish to bring a picnic supper to enjoy with their Scout and friends. Visitors should not plan to arrive at Camp Sidney Dew before 4:00 p.m., as Scouts will be involved in camp-wide activities. The highlight of the evening's activities is the campfire program and the Order of the Arrow ceremony. The OA ceremony will last until approximately 9:30 p.m. Bring a good flashlight to light your way around camp after dark.

In the event of inclement weather, the campfire and tap-out ceremony will be moved to the Dining Hall. Vehicles are not allowed into camp on Friday evenings. Visitor meals may be provided in the Dining Hall on Friday evenings tickets to purchase a meal will be at the Trading Post. There are no facilities at Camp Sidney Dew to allow visitors to stay overnight. Any adults staying overnight must be registered adult leaders and have completed Safeguarding Youth Training.

Entering and Leaving Camp

The safety and security of every Scout is of paramount concern to all leaders and Staff. To enhance our security efforts we require parents, leaders, and Scouts to sign in and sign out at the Administration building when entering or leaving camp during the week. Anyone who is leaving camp early will need to check out at the Hubbs Administration Building with our staff. Scouts must be accompanied by an adult from the unit to authorize the departure.

Guest hours begin at 7:00am and end at 10:00pm. There should be no guests on-camp before or after that time.

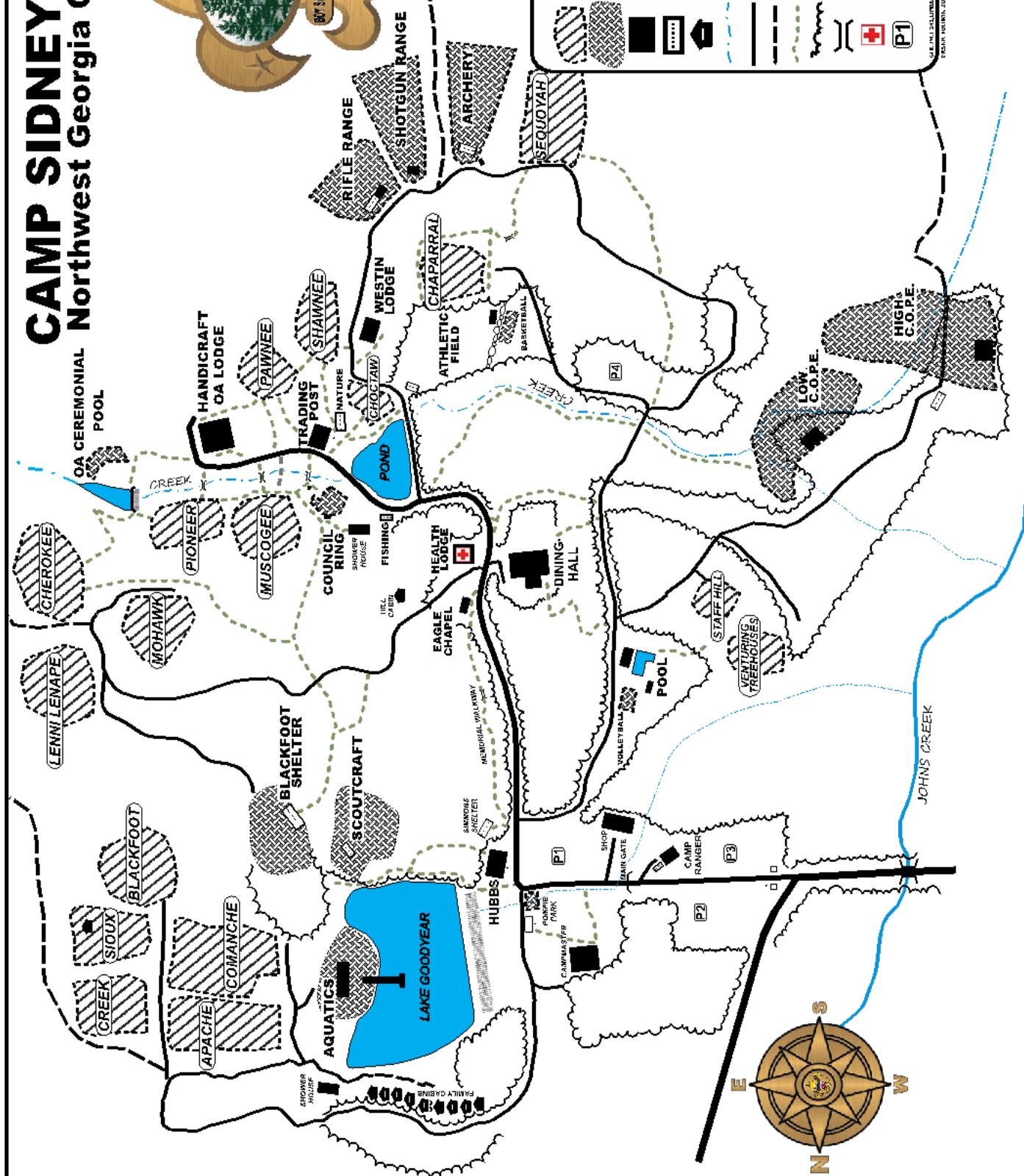
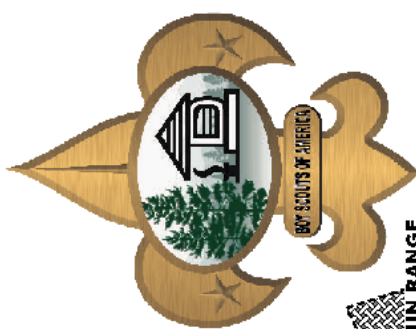

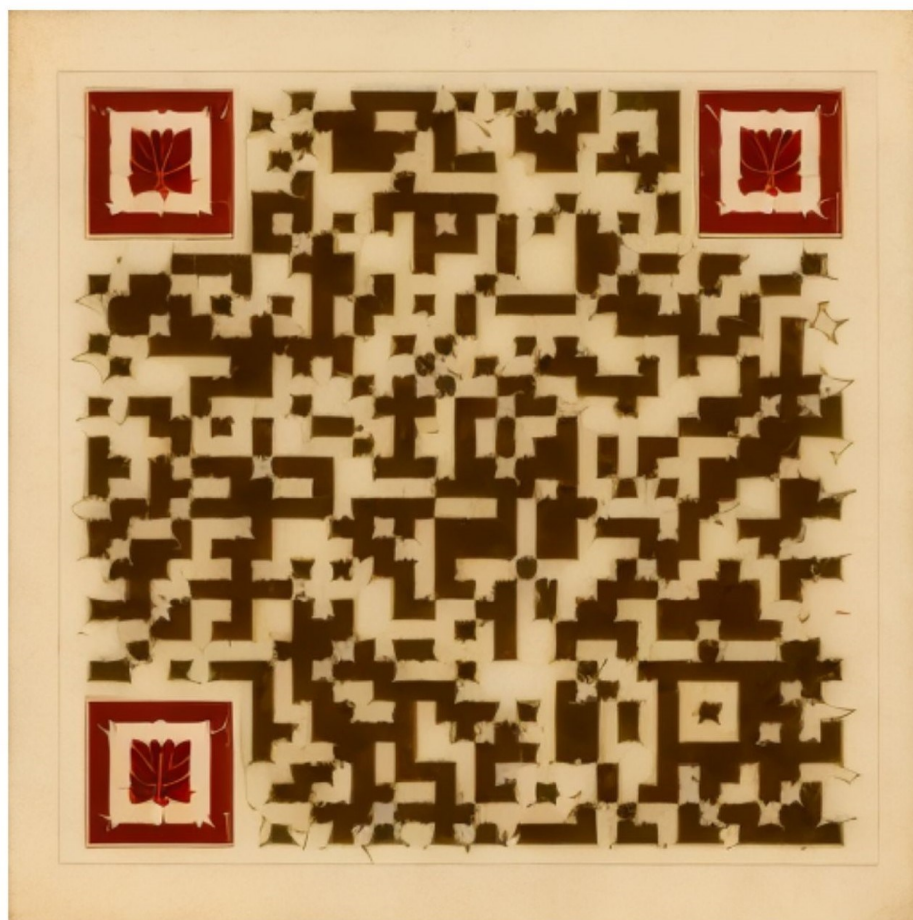
